College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP) — Grant/Scholarship

Deadline: Varies for each applicant

The College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP) is a unique federally-funded educational support and scholarship program that helps more than 2,000 students annually from migrant and seasonal farm-working backgrounds to reach and succeed in college. Participants receive financial assistance during their freshman year of college and ongoing academic support until their graduation. Application deadlines and award amounts vary for each grant, and will depend on applicant’s unmet financial needs as per FAFSA and individual college guidelines. Applies to a list of 35-40 current colleges and universities.

Burger King Scholars Scholarship

Created in memory of BURGER KING® Co-founder James “Jim” W. McLamore, the BURGER KINGSM Scholars program has awarded \$28.3 million in scholarships to more than 26,800 high school students, BK® employees and their families across the U.S., Canada and Puerto Rico since 2000. In 2016 alone, the Foundation awarded \$3 million to more than 2,800 students in North America. Scholarship grants range from \$1,000 to \$50,000 and are intended to help students offset the cost of attending college or post-secondary vocational/technical school. Recipients are selected based on their grade point average (GPA), work experience, extracurricular activities and community service.

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Foot Locker Scholar Athletes Scholarship

Twenty Foot Locker Scholar Athletes will each receive \$20,000 in college scholarship money for their excellence in school, on their sports teams, and in their communities. The scholarship will be awarded in four equal annual payments of \$5,000 throughout the winner's four-year college career. In addition to the \$20,000 Foot Locker Scholar Athletes scholarship, one of the 20 winners will also be selected for the Ken C. Hicks scholarship for demonstrating superior educational achievement, outstanding leadership, and a true love of the game. This winner will receive an additional \$5000 award (for a total of \$25,000). This student will receive their scholarship in four yearly installments, each of \$6,250.

GE-Reagan Foundation Scholarship Program

Honoring the legacy and character of our nation's 40th President, the GE-Reagan Foundation Scholarship Program rewards college-bound students who demonstrate exemplary leadership, drive, integrity, and citizenship with financial assistance to pursue higher education. Each year, the Program selects numerous recipients to receive a \$10,000 scholarship renewable for up to an additional three years – up to \$40,000 total per recipient. Awards are for undergraduate and graduate study, and may be used for education-related expenses, including tuition, fees, books, supplies, room, and board. In addition, Scholars are invited to participate in a special awards program.

APIASF Scholarship Program

The APIASF General Scholarship Application for the 2017-2018 academic year is now available! The application deadline is January 11, 2017 at 11:59 PM ET. The application is open to new or continuing undergraduate students attending a U.S. accredited college or university in the Fall of 2017. Scholarship awards range from one-time \$2,500 awards to multi-year \$20,000 awards. APIASF provides scholarships to Asian American Pacific Islander students with a focus on those who live at or below the poverty level, or are otherwise of low socioeconomic status; are the first in their families to attend college; are representative of the AA-PI community's diversity, and have placed strong emphasis on community service and leadership as well as academic achievement. 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The Dream US Scholarships

Deadlines: 2/1/17 for Opportunity Scholarship, 3/8/17 for National Scholarship

Dream US offers two scholarships. The National Scholarship is for high school or community college graduates who have DACA or TPC status and qualify for in-state tuition at one of our Partner Colleges (up to \$12,500 for an associates degree and \$25,000 for a bachelor's degree). The Opportunity Scholarship is for students who live in targeted, locked-out states that do not offer in-state tuition to DREAMers; applicants need to have DACA or TPS status and be admitted to one of our Opportunity Partner Colleges to receive this scholarship (up to \$80,000 to cover tuition, fees, on-campus housing and meals for a bachelor's degree).

Asian Youth in Action (AYA) at CAAAV

Deadline: 1/2/17

Asian Youth in Action is a 7-month internship program running from February 2017 to August 2017 for youth ages 14-20. This is an opportunity for Asian young people who speak Bangla, Korean, Mandarin, and/or Cantonese to serve low-income Asian immigrant communities. Interns will gain hands-on experience through: working with the Chinatown Tenants Union of the NYCHA Organizing Project for 10 hours each month; monthly leadership skills trainings and social issues workshops including racial justice, feminism, housing rights, economic justice, multilingual interpretation, and more; monthly team-building workshops to develop friendships and events with other youth and immigrants from across the city; building a youth-directed project as a group that centers uplifting our communities. Upon completion of the program, interns will receive a transportation stipend, community service hours (if applicable), and letters of recommendation.

Eckshate: Gender Justice Program

Eckshate, meaning "together" in Bangla and Urdu/Hindi, is a 4-month program for working-class South Asian and Indo-Caribbean folks that identify as women or non-binary/trans women, from but not limited to Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Bhutan, Guyana, India, Nepal, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, and Trinidad, ages 13 to 23, who live in New York City. Eckshate is DRUMs (Desis Rising Up and Moving) gender justice program. The program's goal is to engage participants to combat gender-based discrimination and oppression through healing in safe spaces, political education, sharing experiences and workshops on dealing with harassment and abuse. Together, we will be able to learn about the South Asian diaspora and strategize to fight sexism!
